February Meeting

It is very fitting that we should ask Reed Jarvis, winner of this year's Annual Historian Award, to speak to us on February 10th on "The Role of the Public Historian."

As Bill Woodward pointed out in his banquet introduction, Reed has been a very successful developer of historic sites in the Federal system through quiet perseverance. Outside that system he might have become well-known for years of achievements of which the most recent is Ebey's Landing National Historic Reserve on Whidbey Island.

Reed passes on the published words of Victoria Harden, "Federal historians, whether civil servants or contractors, do not speak or write from a personal viewpoint when acting in their official capacities on matters that have political consequences for their agencies. Their work... is subject to review and approval by agency administrators. In some cases, this situation has led to highly public controversies. Federal historians are expected to be generalists They must be diplomats when contacted by people who have a burning conviction about some issue, no matter how bizarre."

He discreetly refers to "a special obligation in presenting unbiased and well-balanced interpretation of history to which the public historian must adhere. I could use some good examples from my Park Service experience." Now retired from government service, he can bring some examples and the discussion may be more open. For example, was it true three years back that true that guides at the Grand Canyon were forbidden to mention that it was older than Adam?

Dootson, too principled to accept money for his campaign and likely to lose, still refused all funds and all suggestions. Snohomish's radical leftist legislator and the man Gorton most admired in the Washington legislature even though at the far opposite end of the political spectrum, went down in defeat. This and Gorton's other stories of politicians here and in the other Washington entertained and educated us in how representative government works for better or worse. Even by the standards of past Annual Banquets, the gathering was an unusually enjoyable event.

The evening began with an hour of complimentary drinks (thanks to a gift from Cork Hardinge) before moving on to dinner and a very brief business meeting by President Paul Spitzer. Bill Woodward gave Reed Jarvis an introduction that explained why the Guild proudly made him the recipient of this year's Annual Historian's Award. Senator Gorton, after being welcomed to the podium by former Guild President Doris Pieroth, closed out the evening.
