

MAY 2011 MONTHLY MEETING

Meeting Tuesday May 17th

We close out another year with a program by David B. Williams. Most people don't think of looking for geology from the sidewalks of a major city, but for the intrepid geologist any "good rock" can tell a fascinating story. All one has to do is look at the stone used to construct buildings in downtown business districts to find a range of rocks equal to any assembled by plate tectonics. Furthermore, building stones provide the foundation for focusing on cultural as well as natural history. He will discuss the local stone used around Puget Sound, as well as some of the more exotic rock that has come into the city.

Williams is the author of *Stories in Stone: Travels Through Urban Geology*. Each chapter focuses on a different stone from around the country. To write the book, he traveled to the quarries and stone yards to discuss how people work the rocks; met with historians and preservationists to discuss the social history of the stone; and went out in the field with geologists to discover how the rocks formed and how that influenced the rock's qualities as a building material. Topics range from the 3.5-billion-year old gneiss quarried in Morton, Minnesota to a petrified wood gas station in eastern Colorado to the granite in the Bunker Hill Monument, a use that lead to the first commercial railroad in the United States.
