The 1962 Seattle World's Fair -- Century 21 Exposition -- had it all, optimistically looking ahead to theorize and imagine what the future might hold."

It was an internationally sanctioned fair which "captured America at the peak of Cold War tensions, on the cusp of a cultural revolution. Behind the fair's glitter ...civic leaders, elected officials, and public citizens who built the fair's success vowed that when the lights went out...Seattle would be left with a much-needed civic center." The Seattle Center is "the brilliant and remarkable legacy of a fondly remembered six months in 1962." The Guild has enjoyed past meetings with this engaging duo.

Paula Becker is a staff historian for HistoryLink.org, with essays on the dance marathon craze of the 1920s, war-effort knitting during World Wars I and II, and the career of The Egg and I author Betty MacDonald, among numerous other subjects. She co-wrote with Alan *Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition:* Washington's First World's Fair, and The Future Remembered: The 1962 Seattle World's Fair and Its Legacy.

Alan J. Stein is also a staff historian and award-winning author. His HistoryLink books include, *Safe Passage: The Birth of Washington State Ferries; Bellevue Timeline: The Story of Washington's Leading Edge City; The Olympic: The Story of Seattle's Landmark Hotel;* and, with Paula Becker, their AYPE book. He is past president of the Association of King County Historical Organizations.
