The monthly Guild meetings have been scheduled through the end of the calendar year. Although the exact number is uncertain, September is approximately our three hundredth evening lecture since we began thirty years ago.

September: Our new season begins as a joint meeting with the Southwest Historical Society. We welcome George Blomberg who will speak on the history and scope of landscape change in south Elliott Bay and the Duwamish River estuary, 1854 to the present. He'll illustrate his talk with pictures of the tidelands, the estuary, the river straightening projects, pollution of the river over time, superfund sites, and contemporary restoration efforts in the Duwamish industrial area.

His presentation is part of the Seaport Environmental Programs by the Port of Seattle. George has been working on industrial development and environmental matters at the port since 1985.

NOTE: The event is NOT at our usual time and place. Actually it's near the spot on Alki Point where pollution began when the Denny party landed. We'll meet at the Log Cabin Museum at 7pm.
